Reading Skills We Often Overlook: The Importance of Experience and Background Knowledge



Students need to have some language experience and background knowledge in order to become strong reader.s Background knowledge is crucial so that your student can read, then have some context to understand what he or she is reading.

1. Contextual Understanding: Background knowledge helps readers make sense of the text.

2. Vocabulary: Readers with prior knowledge are likely to understand and infer meanings of new words and phrases within the text.

3. Schema: When readers encounter familiar concepts, their mental frameworks (or schemas) activate. Schema is a fancy way of saying "experience" or "background knowledge."

4. Engagement and Motivation: When readers are engaged with the content, they are more likely to invest effort into understanding the material. They'll be motivated to read and learn more.

5. Critical Thinking: Background knowledge provides the foundation for basic understanding of texts, making it easier for readers to engage in critical thinking and discussions about the material. At Weldon, students are growing into students who read to learn. They spend some years learning to read, but eventually the intent shifts to READING to LEARN.

You can help build up your child's experience and background knowledge in a few simple ways. To start with, have a real conversation about anything that is interesting to you: space, plants, animals, cars, clothing, foods you love, movies you like watching, places you have visited, or even what it used to be like when you were a child. Put the phones and tablets away and talk to each other to build vocabulary. Secondly, you can visit places around our town and learn many interesting things. Our town has old buildings; banks, mansions, theaters, and hospitals. Our town has railroad tracks that lead to many places and carry important goods and materials. Our town has a museum. Our town has a unique history in the oil and gas industry. Our town has a lake with lots of interesting things to see and do.
